LESSON PLAN 10: Designing a Collagraphic Printing Plate of a Building

Title of the Lesson

Making a collagraph printing plate

Definition of a Collagraph: A cardboard collage layered with found objects used as a plate from which to make prints.

Lesson Developed by: Nia Mason

Lesson designed for Grade(s) 2nd, 3rd, 4th & 5th gradegrades

Time Required for Lesson: 2 hrs or 2-3 class periods One hour to make the basic form One hour to add texture and details

Lesson Aim:

To create a collagraphic plate n the form of a brownstone or other New York City structure using the edge of various materials to create the line in the printed image made from the plate. Remember the image print is reversed from the plate.

Big Idea(s) of this Lesson Students will understand that:

- Artists observe and depict the world around them.
- Artists use many methods to create line in an image.
 Artists use the technique of printmaking to create multiples of the same image.

Essential Question(s) of this Lesson: Students will answer:

- How do the details of an image give it character?
- How can I express a personal point of view through a collagraphic print?
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Indicators of Student Learning

- CONTENT Students will know:
 - how to construct a collagraph.
 - how to create line by using the edges and textures of various materials. how to make a print using a collagraph plate.

SKILLS - Students will be able to:

- create a collagraph and make multiple prints from it
- work in cooperation with other students to accomplish their goal

Vocabulary: collagraph, plate, print, printmaking ink, brownstone, architectural detail, texture, edge

Repeat directions a second time slowly for English Language Learners. Small group support: Work in a small group with students who are having difficulty with the task.

- 3. Select materials to create structural image

- 4. Complete collagraph
- 5. Make a series of prints and a group print from the plates
