1. Briefly describe the project. What was done, when and where did project activities take place, and who were the beneficiaries?

Overall objective of the project was to provide funding for specific classroom projects that due to economic conditions were not funded at the local level. We wanted to encourage and support our educational professionals in their efforts. Specifically we wanted to encourage enrichment programs that had the broadest impact. We also looked for programs that would be sustainable beyond the 2014/2015 school year. Our objective was to fund 10-12 programs at about \$500 per project, for a total of \$6,800.

We started by with meeting all the Principals at the eight target schools. We introduced the program, gave them program guidelines and teacher application forms (see examples in Document section). Timelines were announced, and implementation plans discussed. Meanwhile the Rotary project team established judging criteria. Once the applications were received, we evaluated the applications and ranked them accordingly. The response the program was outstanding. We received a total of 26 applications,

Funding was awarded to 14 programs vs. our original objective of 10-12. This was due to the dollar amount required for each project. This involved a total of seven (7) schools.

Each project was assigned an Anaheim Hills Rotarian, who was the prime contact for the teacher and the school. This involved a total of five members. The project leader then worked with the teachers to finalize the bill of materials for each project, Then the respective Rotarians procured the items required for each project and either had them shipped to the school or to their home. In some cases Rotarians visited the school and saw the projects being implemented.

At the conclusion of the project, we hosted three Teacher Recognition dinners (Jan 15th, April 9th and April 16th). These dinners were part of our regular weekly meetings. At these meetings the teachers, and several Principals, presented their projects to the Club members. The teachers either did hands on demonstrations, Power Point Presentations or videos. The teachers were very enthusiastic and appreciative of our support. See copies of our newsletters in the photo section for more details. This was a great conclusion to our grant project as it allowed the entire membership to meet all the teachers and learn about the projects directly from the teachers. It also allowed teachers from several schools to interact and benchmark each other's projects.

2. How many Rotarians participated in the project?

There were five project team members involved in the implementation, then the entire Club participated in the Teacher Recognition Dinners.

3. What did they do? Please give at least two examples.

As per Section 1 above, each Project team member was fully engaged in the project from meeting with the Principals, evaluating the applications, purchasing the supplied, delivering them, then later seeing the projects being implemented. Finally, all welcomed the teachers to our meetings, hosted them at dinner and introduced them to the members.

This was big undertaking as it really was 14 projects under the umbrella of one master project (P 606).

4. How many non-Rotarians benefited from this project?

This is best answered on two levels: short term, a good estimate would be about 1,200 students and faculty. I could make a case for an even larger number depending on how you count the school wide projects

On a long-term basis, most of these project have multiyear impacts ranging from 2 – 15 years, with the Sensory Garden being a prime example of a project that could easily last 15 -20 years. On a side note, as this project was for the Canyon Hills Special School, the Board has decided that our Club will "adopt" this garden and maintain it in the future, so that these special students can be assured the garden will continue to benefit them for years to come.

5. What are the expected long-term community impacts of the project?

Assets that previously not available to the teachers due to funding limitations were made available by this project, student enrichment, motivated faculty and extensive exposure of the Anaheim Hills Rotary Club's work in the community, as well as things we stand for, such as Service Above Self. When the teachers attended our dinner meetings they had an opportunity to learn more about AHRC and Rotary in general.

The May 7th edition of the Orange County Register, Anaheim Bulletin had a major article about our Aid For Educational Supplies Project (see Documents for copy of the article).

6. If a cooperating organization was involved, what was its role?

The Sensory Garden at Canyon Hills School was primarily an Eagle Scout Project that we funded and participated in. We have now adopted the Sensory Garden and will do maintenance and replacement work as needed.
