



#### -MISSION-

In partnership with the community, Homeless Youth Connection raises awareness and meets the needs of homeless youth so they can stay in school and graduate.

Homeless Youth Connection is eligible for the Arizona Charitable Tax Credit Program for the Working Poor, §ARS43-1088. State taxpayers may be eligible for an Arizona State tax credit up to \$200 for individuals and \$400 for married couples.



# Studies Have Shown...

- Youth ages 12 to 17 are more at risk of homelessness than adults
- 75 percent of homeless or runaway youth have dropped out or will drop out of school
- There are more than 4,000 homeless youth ages 12 to 19 in Arizona
- 75 percent of runaways are female
- 46 percent of runaway and homeless youth reported being physically abused, 38 percent reported being emotionally abused, and 17 percent reported being forced into unwanted sexual activity by a family or household member

Unaccompanied homeless youth, often referred to as "youth on their own" is the most difficult subpopulation of homelessness to quantify. Many homeless youth do what they have to do in order to survive, such as sleeping in cars, bartering sex for shelter, "couch surfing" from one friend's house to another, or residing with abusive family members who threaten to "kick them out." Without real support, such youth may find themselves in and out of jail, dependent on the welfare system, or living their life in a chronic state of crisis.

## What is Empowering Youth For the Future?

Homeless Youth Connection offers the Empowering Youth For the Future (EYFTF) program to provide homeless youth the resources they need to stay in school and graduate. Funding from EYFTF provides basic needs, case management, housing, and life skills.



### Who do we serve?

- HYC serves homeless youth 13 to 19 years of age
- Youth attend high schools in the following districts: Agua Fria. Buckeye, Dysart, Peoria, Saddle Mountain and Tolleson
- · Each youth is identified by their school as homeless under the McKinney-Vento Act
- · Youth must be free of substance abuse
- · Youth are without a stable home and homeless through no fault or choice of their own



## It's about partnerships.



HYC works closely with high school counselors. teachers and administrators to identify homeless youth who need services. Once a student is identified, a call is made to HYC case managers who meet with the youth and school representative to determine the youth's

needs and level of service. Thanks to collaborations with local community agencies, organizations, and businesses youth receive a wide range of services, including tutoring, medical care, counseling, mentoring, life skills training, and career assistance.

**SEEDS (Social Emotional Education Development for** Success) is designed to build cognitive, academic, social, and emotional competence for every student while still allowing each student to focus on individual strengths, talents, interests and future potential.

services. HYC creates partnerships between school organizations, service organizations and the ecumenical community within the school district to establish the host homes and provide a support network to assist with transportation, tutoring, meals

Through a series of independent workshops, and with guidance from their mentor, students are able to tailor a program to fit their specific needs. By offering independent workshops, the student charts his/her own path and determines which course(s) they'll participate in based on their interests, age, and current or future needs. Since each student creates their own program, they also gain ownership, and therefore, responsibility for the results. Program success is measured by the improved social and educational skills the youth develop.

## How can you make a difference?

HYC is engaging community members, to invest in homeless youth, empowering them to reach their full potential and become successful, contributing members of our community.

Investing in a youth is not just about providing monetary support — it is about becoming a champion for a youth by providing homeless teens with housing, basic needs and services as they make positive, life-affirming choices toward becoming responsible, productive adults.
