Progress Report Final Report

1. Briefly describe the project. What was done, when and where did project activities take place, and who were the beneficiaries? Three projects were completed. The third graders of all seven elementary schools located in the City of Laguna Niguel were each provided with their own personal dictionary in November, 2015. In April, 2016 third graders in each of the seven elementary schools in the City of Laguna Niguel were provided with a drought resistant lemonadeberry tree in observance of Arbor Day. On July 6, 2016, a check in the amount of \$1,200 was sent to Hidden Hills Elementary School to provide for 6 camperships for deserving students who otherwise could not afford to attend the 5th Grade Science Camp. The importance of learning and the importance of taking care of our environment were stressed. Learning opportunities and caring for the environment are both very important topics for children.

2. How many Rotarians participated in the project? 23 Rotarians participated.

2. What did they do? Please give at least two examples. Rotarians attended a "sticker" party hosted by the project leader for the purpose of placing Rotary stickers and Rotary labels in each dictionary. Subsequently, Rotarians distributed a dictionary to a third grader in each of the seven elementary schools in the City of Laguna Niguel. This project was completed in early November, 2015. For Arbor Day, 650 drought resistant trees were ordered from the Tree of Life Nursery. Rotarians met at the project leader's home to place the small trees into a protective plastic bag after inserting a label explaining the importance of observing Arbor Day. These small trees were handed out by Rotarians to third graders in each of the Laguna Niguel's seven elementary schools. The Arbor Day project was completed on April 22, 2016. On July 6, 2016, a check in the amount of \$1,200 was sent to the principal of Hidden Hills Elementary School in order to provide 6 camperships to students who otherwise could not afford to attend the schools' 5th grade Science Camp.

4. How many non-Rotarians benefited from this project? The entire community benefitted (school age children, their parents and school administration personnel. When asked if they had used the dictionaries distributed to them in November, 2015, practically all of the children raised their hands. Dictionaries provide an opportunity for children to learn – particularly when computers aren't available and homework assignments need to be completed. Children also learn about the importance of taking care of their environment. Trees provide oxygen, humans provide carbon dioxide, so plant life benefits and humans benefit. Projects such as this promote Rotary and let folks know that we are interested in providing learning opportunities and community service. As for the 5th grade Science Camp, that experience is invaluable to students and our contribution enabled 6 students to attend the camp that otherwise could not afford the \$200 per child fee.

5. What are the expected long-term community impacts of the project? Enhancing learning opportunities for children and letting folks know about Rotary and about what we do to provide support to our community.

6. If a cooperating organization was involved, what was its role? All three projects were completed by members of the Rotary Club of Laguna Niguel
