PARENTS send their kids to school thinking they'll be safe there.

But playgrounds have become dangerous and even deadly!

Everyone is worried about the serious cases of violence at Mzansi schools that keep making headlines. Bullying is a big problem. It can be de-

fined as one or more people focusing on and repeatedly hurt-

ing someone else physically or mental-

And it is not just kids who bully one an-

Bullying also happens between teachers, pupils and even principals.

According to a 2012 report, bullying is worst at inner city schools.

The Centre For Justice and Crime Prevention pointed out in their study published last year that most violent incidents at schools were carried out by the pupils themselves.

When pupils are exposed to violence when they are still young, they learn to

communicate by being cruel. Shockingly, kids have a bigger chance of becoming victims of violence while they're at school than when they're away from school.

The Free State has the biggest

problem with violence in schools, followed by the Western Cape and Limpopo.

The Northern Cape was the worst when it came to sexual assaults, with 11,2% of pupils becoming victims.

There are many different types of bullying

■ Physical bullying: when people uses their bodies or weapons to gain power over others.

This includes kicking, punching, hitting and other physical attacks.

■ Verbal bullying occurs when words are used in a negative way.

This includes insults, teasing and put-downs to gain power over someone else's life.

■ Non-verbal bullying: actions that are meant to insult or tease someone, including making rude signs, leaving someone out of a game on purpose and graffiti.

Social bullying: causing problems for someone's social life through actions such as gossiping.

Sexual bullying: any sort of bullying that has to do with sex.

Cyber bullying: the use of platforms

such as email, WhatsApp and social networks to bully a person by sending threatening messages or spreading gos-

sip. Bullying can turn deadly.

In October, Daily Sun published a story about 18-year-old Bongani Nkab-inde of Izimele High School in KZN who was speared to death by a rival tradition-

al music group.

In 2012, the People's Paper published the story of Nkululeko Ndlovu (18), who was shot dead at Phineas Xulu Secondary School in Vosloorus. Some pupils said he was a bully but many


