Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani Centre for Child Heart Care was chosen as the implementing partner because of its proven expertise, advanced infrastructure, skilled medical team, and inclusive philosophy of providing free pediatric cardiac care to all children, regardless of background or financial status.

Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani is a reputed chain of pediatric cardiac hospitals in India, with centers located in Navi Mumbai (Maharashtra), Raipur (Chhattisgarh), and Palwal (Haryana). These hospitals are fully equipped to diagnose and treat congenital heart disease through world-class surgical and interventional procedures—completely free of cost. Since its inception, the Navi Mumbai centre alone has successfully performed over 4,400 pediatric heart surgeries.

The centre's comprehensive ecosystem includes state-of-the-art facilities for diagnosis, surgery, and post-operative care, as well as programs for mother-and-child outreach, capacity building, and clinical research.

The Rotary Club of London, Ontario, Canada expressed strong interest in the project’s objectives and agreed to partner with us as the international sponsor. This partnership is built on shared humanitarian goals and mutual commitment to improving children’s health outcomes.

Rotary Club of Dombivli East has an experienced team comprising professionals from diverse fields, with proven expertise in implementing Rotary Foundation–funded projects. The club’s structured approach, combined with continuous guidance from senior Rotarians who have successfully executed similar projects, will ensure effective implementation and smooth coordination with international partners.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

The project addresses the urgent need for affordable and accessible treatment for children with congenital heart disease (CHD) from economically disadvantaged families across India. CHD is the most common congenital birth defect, affecting 8–12 of every 1,000 live births, with nearly 200,000–250,000 new cases annually in India.

Many children die due to lack of timely diagnosis, specialized pediatric cardiac facilities, and the high cost of treatment. Only one in four children who need surgery receive appropriate care. Families from low-income groups are unable to bear the financial burden, making CHD a leading cause of preventable child mortality. This project will provide free, life-saving cardiac surgeries for 75 children, thereby reducing child mortality, improving quality of life, and relieving financial stress on affected families.

How did your project team identify these needs?

The needs were identified through a community assessment conducted by the Rotary Club of Dombivli East in collaboration with Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani Centre for Child Heart Care. The team engaged in direct discussions with:

- * Hospital authorities (medical and administrative staff)
- * Families of children undergoing treatment
- * Pediatric doctors from both government and private hospitals who refer patients

The assessment, conducted in June 2025 (with prior engagements in 2022 and earlier Global Grant projects), involved in-person interviews, hospital visits, and review of hospital data and patient records. These discussions consistently highlighted the unaffordability of surgeries, long waiting lists, and limited awareness about CHD among rural populations.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

Families of children with CHD actively participated by sharing their experiences, challenges, and expectations regarding diagnosis, treatment, and follow-up care. Their feedback helped shape the project's focus on funding surgeries for the most urgent and economically vulnerable cases.

The hospital's medical team contributed insights on operational gaps, prioritization criteria, and the number of children awaiting surgery. Through these interactions, the project team was able to design a realistic, sustainable intervention that directly meets community-identified needs.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

Community participation was central to project planning. Parents and families helped identify key barriers, such as cost, travel, and post-surgery support needs. The hospital authorities, representing the community's healthcare providers, guided the selection criteria for beneficiaries, the treatment protocols, and the follow-up mechanisms.

The Rotary Club of Dombivli East incorporated this input into project design — defining the number of surgeries to be supported, the reporting system, and long-term sustainability through ongoing hospital follow-up and Rotary monitoring.

This collaborative planning ensured that the project aligns with both medical priorities and community expectations, while leveraging the strengths of the Rotary–hospital partnership.

This project works in coordination with ongoing community initiatives led by the Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani Centre for Child Heart Care, which conducts awareness, screening, and early diagnosis programs in partnership with local hospitals and pediatricians. Children identified with congenital heart disease (CHD) through these efforts are referred for treatment at the Centre.

Our Global Grant complements these initiatives by funding free surgeries for economically disadvantaged children, ensuring a complete continuum of care—from detection to treatment and follow-up.

While some government and NGO programs provide limited support, they are unable to meet the large demand for pediatric cardiac care. This project bridges that critical gap, strengthening existing local efforts and extending life-saving care to more children in need.

Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.

This project includes community outreach and educational activities in partnership with the Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani Centre for Child Heart Care to raise awareness about congenital heart disease (CHD) and promote early diagnosis.

The hospital conducts medical screening and awareness camps with local health authorities and pediatricians, and Rotary members will assist in organizing these camps and sharing information through community and digital platforms.

Educational sessions for parents will cover early detection, timely treatment, and post-surgery care. The project will also include brief orientation and coordination sessions for Rotary and hospital teams to strengthen implementation and communication.

These activities will build community awareness and encourage families to seek early medical intervention for affected children.

How were these needs identified?

The need for community outreach and education was identified during discussions with hospital authorities,

doctors, and parents at the Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani Centre for Child Heart Care. Many families shared that lack of awareness about congenital heart disease (CHD) and its symptoms often leads to delayed diagnosis and treatment.

Medical professionals also emphasized that early detection through awareness and screening programs significantly improves outcomes. Based on these insights, the project team recognized the importance of including training and educational activities alongside funding for surgeries to ensure long-term community impact and sustainability.

What incentives (for example, monetary compensation, awards, certification, or publicity), will you use, if any, to encourage community members to participate in the project?

Community participants will be recognized through certificates and public acknowledgment during Rotary meetings and awareness events. They will also be invited to join future outreach activities, encouraging continued involvement and community ownership. These simple recognitions will motivate participation and strengthen Rotary's connection with the community.

The Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani Centre for Child Heart Care will continue to oversee the long-term follow-up of all operated children, conducting routine check-ups at one month, six months, and annually to monitor their recovery and overall health.

In addition, the Rotary Club of Dombivli East project team will remain in contact with both the beneficiary families and the hospital authorities to track outcomes, provide support where needed, and ensure the project's sustained impact beyond the grant period.

This Global Grant Agreement (Agreement) is entered into by The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International (TRF), Rotary Foundation (India) (RF(I)), and the grant sponsors (Sponsors). In consideration of receiving this Rotary Foundation Global Grant (Grant) from TRF, the Sponsors agree that:

1. All information contained in this application is, to the best of our knowledge, true and accurate.
2. We have read the Terms and Conditions for Rotary Foundation District Grants and Global Grants (Terms and Conditions) and will adhere to all policies therein.
3. The Sponsors shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless RF(I), Rotary International (RI), and TRF, including their directors, trustees, officers, committee members, employees, agents, associate foundations and representatives (collectively Rotary), from and against all claims, including but not limited to claims of subrogation, demands, actions, damages, losses, costs, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees and other legal expenses), awards, judgments, and fines asserted against or recovered from Rotary arising out of any act, conduct, omission, negligence, misconduct, or unlawful act (or act contrary to any applicable governmental order or regulation) resulting directly or indirectly from a Sponsor's and/or participant's involvement in grant-funded activities, including all travel related to the grant.

4. The failure of the parties to comply with the terms of this Agreement due to an act of God, strike, government regulation, war, fire, riot, civil unrest, hurricane, earthquake, or other natural disasters, acts of public enemies, curtailment of transportation facilities, political upheavals, civil disorders, outbreak of infectious disease or illness, acts of terrorism, or any similar cause beyond the control of the parties shall not be deemed a breach of this Agreement. In such an event, the Agreement shall be deemed terminated and the Sponsors shall refund to RF(I)/TRF all unexpended global grant funds within 30 days of termination.
5. RF(I)/TRF's entire responsibility is expressly limited to payment of the total financing amount. RF(I) and TRF do not assume any further responsibility in connection with this grant.
6. RF(I) and TRF reserve the right to cancel the grant and/or this Agreement without notice upon the failure of either or both of the Sponsors to abide by the terms set forth in this Agreement and the Terms and Conditions. Upon cancellation, RF(I)/TRF shall be entitled to a refund from the Sponsors of any global grant funds, including any interest earned, that have not been expended.
7. The laws of the State of Illinois, USA, without reference to its conflicts of laws principles, shall govern all matters arising out of or relating to this Agreement, including, without limitation, its interpretation, construction, performance, and enforcement.
8. Any legal action brought by either party against the other party arising out of or relating to this Agreement must be brought in either, the Circuit Court of Cook County, State of Illinois, USA or the Federal District Court for the Northern District of Illinois, USA. Each party consents to the exclusive jurisdiction of these courts, and their respective appellate courts for the purpose of such actions. Nothing herein prohibits a party that obtains a judgment in either of the designated courts from enforcing the judgment in any other court.
